The PBO conducts annually an in-service training examination in July. All orthopaedic residents-in-training are required to take the examination. This serves as an assessment or evaluation on how the residents in the different year level of training compare to the rest of the total population of orthopaedic residents on percentile basis. For the senior residents or the 4th year graduating residents, the in- service training examination serves as the qualifying examination preparatory to diplomate examinations.

The diplomate examination are conducted once annually in October. It consists of a written, oral and practical examination, given on 3 different days. Those candidate who passed the diplomate examinations are considered diplomates of orthopaedics and are already entitled to apply for fellowship to the Philippine Orthopaedic Association, a year after passing it.
